### Airline Miles Through Priceline

**Do you get miles if you book through Priceline?** The answer is more encouraging for flights than hotels. When you fly, you earn miles from the airline based on the flight you took, not where

you booked it. So if you **book flights on Priceline** for a Delta flight, you'll still earn Delta SkyMiles for flying.

However, there's a catch with airline credit cards and loyalty bonuses. **Do I get delta miles if I book through Priceline** using my Delta Amex? You'll earn the standard points for your credit card (maybe 1-2x points), but you won't earn the bonus miles that Delta's credit card offers for purchases directly from Delta.com.

Questions like **do you get delta skymiles if you book through Priceline**, **do i get united miles if i book through Priceline**, and **can you get airline miles if you book through Priceline** all have the same answer: You earn miles from flying (the airline gives you miles based on the ticket fare class and distance flown), but you don't earn bonus miles from credit cards or portals that reward direct airline purchases.

## Credit Card Rewards

Here's where things get interesting: while you might not earn hotel or airline points directly, you can still maximize credit card rewards. Travel rewards cards like Chase Sapphire Preferred, Capital One Venture, or Amex Gold all offer bonus points on travel purchases, including Priceline bookings.

A Chase Sapphire Reserve holder, for example, earns 3x Ultimate Rewards points on Priceline purchases. If you book a \$500 hotel stay, that's 1,500 points (worth \$15-30+ depending on how you redeem them). This doesn't fully replace lost hotel loyalty points, but it softens the blow.

### Does Chase Travel Book Through Priceline?

No, **does chase travel book through Priceline** is a misconception. Chase Travel (now called Chase Travel<sup>SM</sup> powered by Expedia) is a separate portal that Chase credit card holders access to book travel using their Ultimate Rewards points. It's powered by Expedia's technology, not Priceline.

However, if you're a Chase cardholder and don't want to use points, you can absolutely use your Chase card to **book through Priceline** and earn points. Both platforms serve the same general function—aggregating travel options from multiple suppliers—but they're distinct services.

The advantage of Chase Travel for cardholders is the point redemption value boost. Sapphire Reserve holders get 1.5 cents per point value, while Sapphire Preferred holders get 1.25 cents per point. If you have Chase points, using the Chase portal often makes more sense than booking elsewhere. But if you're paying cash and want the best price, Priceline might offer better deals.

## Does Priceline Book Seats Together?

**Does Priceline book seats together** is a common concern for families and couples. The short answer: sometimes, but not reliably. When you book multiple passengers on the same flight through Priceline, the airline's system tries to seat you together based on availability, but this isn't guaranteed, especially on full flights or basic economy fares.

For the best chance of sitting together, follow these steps after booking through Priceline:

1. Use your airline confirmation number to access the booking on the airline's website
2. Select seats yourself if seat selection is available for your fare type
3. If seat selection isn't free, decide whether paying the fee is worth guaranteeing adjacent seats
4. If no adjacent seats are available online, call the airline directly—they sometimes have more flexibility than what shows online
5. Check in exactly 24 hours before departure (when check-in opens) and select seats then if you couldn't earlier

Most airlines try to keep families together, but on budget carriers or basic economy fares, you might need to pay for seat selection or risk being separated. This is one area where \*\*booking directly with the
